Please enjoy its beauty and respect the fruit trees, soft fruit and wildlife.

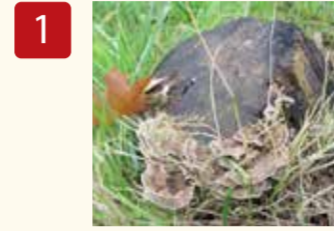

1 Bramley stump with fungi.



2 Medlar 'Nottingham' planted in 2009. Fruit for eating, cooking or jelly making. Ready from October.



3 Victoria plum planted 1995. For eating or cooking. Oval bright red fruit. Ready from late August.



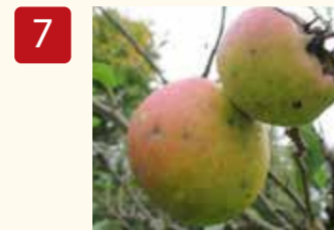
4 Blackcurrant bushes planted 2009 onwards. For eating, squeezing for juice, or cooking. Pick currants when black and juicy from June.



5 Cox's Orange Pippin apple tree planted 1995. For eating. Ready from late September.



6 Apple Cox planted 2013. For eating. Ready from late October.



7 Apple Laxton Superb planted 1995. Tends to be "biennial", sometimes only has fruit every other year. Ready October.



8 Plum stump (Laxton Cropper) left for wildlife.



9 **10** Two unidentified older trees believed to be cider apples. Good for encouraging birds.



11 James Grieve apple tree planted 1995. For eating or cooking. Ready early September. Bruises easily and does not store for long.



12 Damson Shropshire prune planted 2008. For cooking. Damsons ready mid September.



13 Unknown fruit tree planted 2013. Probably an apple.



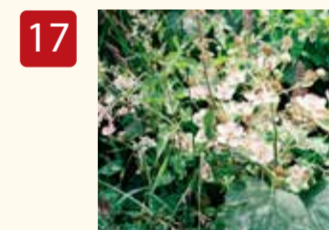
14 Damson Farleigh planted 2008. For cooking. Ready from mid September.



15 A second unknown fruit tree planted 2013. Probably an apple.



16 Laxton's Superb apple tree. Please see tree 7.



17 Blackberries growing wild but are of good size and taste. Blackberry plants and wildflowers along stream side are attractive to wildlife.



18 Elder growing wild in various places by wall. Flowers and fruit can be used for wine making. Attractive to wildlife.
